Driver Unable To Explain Crash


LIVERMORE, April 15.—Douglas Cayard, 27, of Niles, was reported improved today at St. Paul's Hospital, though still semi-conscious from head injuries suffered when his car plunged into a canyon from U.S. Highway 50 yesterday afternoon.

Cayard, unconscious overnight, still has not been able to tell what happened. He was found in the wreckage of his convertible, which apparently had plummeted 100 feet through the air, gouged into the ground and rolled 200 feet more.

Highway patrolmen said he apparently lost control on a curve.

Hospital attendants said his injuries, first considered critical, appeared to be concussion and shock.

The planting progress of the year is 1500 acres a year. The main crop of 1888 was 100,000 bushels of almonds. Only the best European varieties have been planted. Livermore Valley is now known for these grapes which make up the great production of State Vineyards and California.

Civilians who double as police sleuths

LIVERMORE — In January a bank camera recorded the image of a lone gunman as he robbed the Wells Fargo Bank in Pleasanton. Police felt the robber was the same man responsible for a string of other robberies in the Valley. Since the bank film was the only picture available of the suspect, it became imperative that the film be handled with the utmost care. The film was developed and the images were clear enough for identification. It was turned over to the Livermore Police Department and Elliot Dopking, a retired photo technician and member of the department's Pro-Tech team.

The Pro-Techs (short for Professional Technical Reserves) are nine local men who volunteer their time and expertise to the department in a variety of fields, and who would like to be used

when he was arrested by Hayward police — wearing those stained pants. Dopking, who has been involved with the Pro-Tech program for less than a year, was elated with his part in the investigation. "Most citizens don't get a chance to contribute anything to their community," he said. "I was glad that I could."

Dopking is one of two Pro-Tech members with a photography background. Others are chemists, electronics technicians and computer specialists. Although most of the Pro-Techs live in the Valley, one — computer programmer Tom Fredericks — lives in Salinas.

Fredericks commutes to Livermore with "pattern recognition" data, which provides the department's burglary detail with an analysis of past burglaries and a projection of where burglaries will hit based on the location and repeti-

tion of the Pro-Techs can contribute so regularly, however.

Vince Alvarez of Livermore and Pleasanton resident David Simpson are the team's two chemists. Although both have extensive backgrounds in chemistry, their talents are rarely used.

Two years ago there was a move to equip I.D. with a lab for drug analysis. Alvarez said the first thing to go, however, was the lab — as "not the city had to cut its budget on the lab — as the two chemists, Alvarez and full-time police technician Floyd Gregory, said a lab at the police department would speed things up considerably.

"Right now we're sending drugs to the county for analysis," Gregory said. "It usually takes about three weeks for them to I.D. it. If we had the lab here a Pro-Tech could do it in a day."

Gregory added that although the two chemists are not able to work for the department on a regular basis, they do consult them.

Washington clamps hush on lab work

LIVERMORE — The federal government has secretly ordered scientists at Lawrence Livermore Laboratory to keep their mouths shut around foreign colleagues during meetings that involve laser fusion research.

Meanwhile, Livermore scientists have accused the Department of Energy of abusing secrecy guidelines in an attempt to stifle their communications, which they say would step up the pace toward a fusion power reactor.

Reports that the government's action was prompted by the Russian invasion of Afghanistan were neither confirmed nor denied Thursday by State Department officials. However, the hush-up order — known as the Canavan Directive — appears to have stemmed from a related State Department decision which yanked the visas of Soviet scientists who had planned to attend a fusion conference in San Diego earlier this month.

According to sources inside the laboratory, the Feb. 8 directive — which was issued from Washington by the Department of Energy's Dr. Gregory Canavan — sets forth some "dos" and "don'ts" that U.S. fusion experts should observe in dealing with foreign scientists.

The directive was deemed a classification of the Department of Energy who said it falls under the guidelines of confidential national security information.

On Wednesday, the lab's Society of Professional Scientists and Engineers issued a statement calling the directive a "highly objectionable" act.

According to an executive order signed by President Carter in June, 1978, the test for assigning such a classification is whether its disclosure would cause "identifiable damage to the national security."

"There is no question that the Canavan directive fails to meet this test," said the society's statement. "It is clear that the purpose

ed shall not be discussed, debated, taken lightly or in jest," it added.

One Livermore scientist who was advised of the directive, Hugh DeWitt, said the document contains "no technical information at all. It's more of a political document," he said.

Releasing U.S. fusion secrets would aid in foreign development of thermonuclear weapons, government officials say, because of similarities in laser fusion targets with devices that trigger hydrogen bombs.

DeWitt and his associate, Ray Kidder, who founded the lab's laser fusion program in 1962, disagree with the government's reasoning because most of that information, they say, was disclosed during the much-publicized Progressive magazine case.

In its statement, the society speculates that the State Department was the driving force which caused the Department of Energy to issue the directive.

But, a State Department spokesman contacted late Thursday said, "We can't dictate Department of Energy policy to them."

He went on to say that there is an inter-agency advisory policy that says State Department officials can recommend secrecy actions to the Department of Energy.

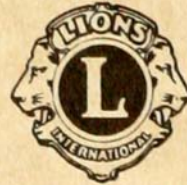
Kidder was very sensitive when asked about the directive and would not confirm or deny statements about its content.

The directive at times is a five-month struggle by Kidder and DeWitt to ease information restrictions on laser fusion research. In fact, DeWitt said the Department of Energy's action "is a direct violation of the Washington Official Information Privacy Act," which prohibits the government from clamping on fusion research would loosen up.

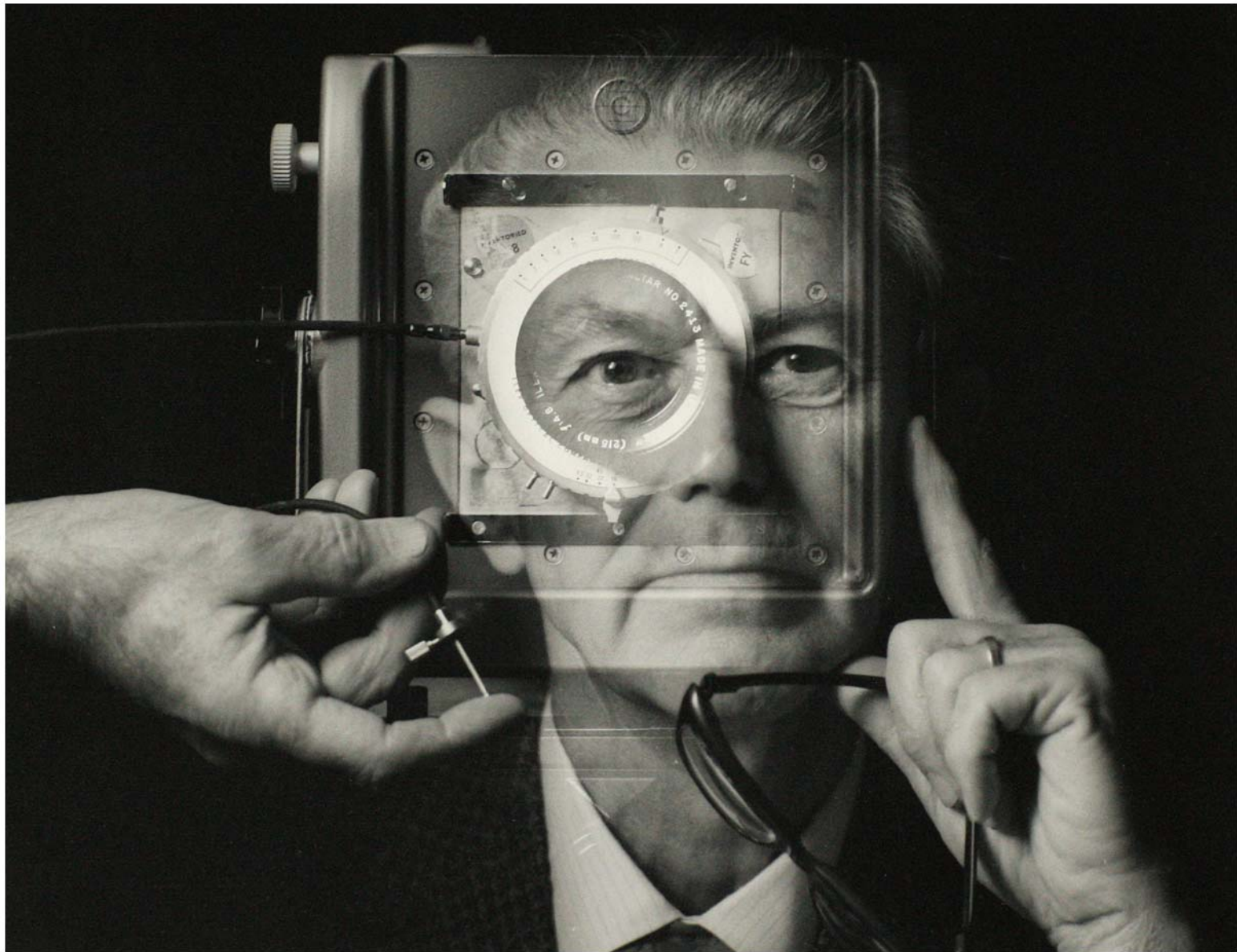

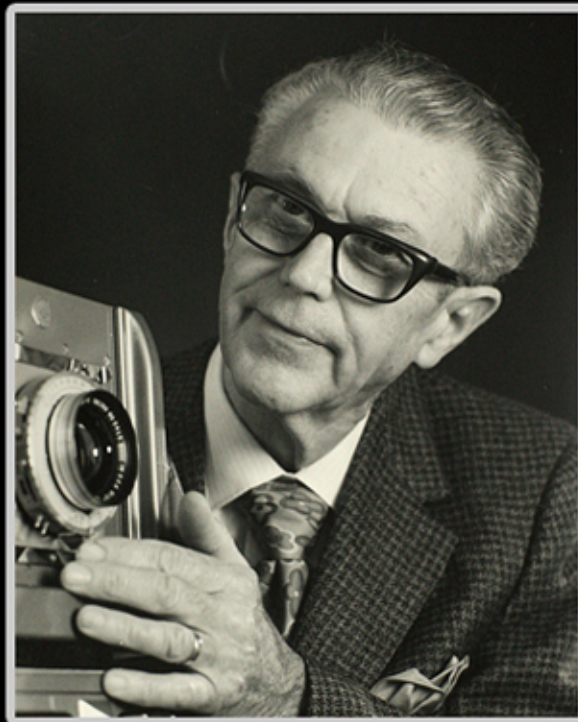
