SP DEPOT The new restaurant THE LIVERMORE STATION will open soon. Watch for our special announcement of a gala pre-view party. Probably in November.

CARNEGIE BUILDING Over eleven hundred visitors saw our exhibit in the new History Center during the Festival. We gained many new members and we look forward to the time when we will have a really valuable resource center. We are pleased that Walter and René Bullard have accepted the co-chairpersonship of the Livermore History Center Committee. It will take time to develop a program of preservation and cataloging and a program of exhibits. We will keep you informed.

MAY SCHOOL At a special board meeting it was decided to make the following statement: "The Livermore Heritage Guild proposes to the Livermore Valley Joint Unified School District that we purchase for the token sum of one dollar the century-old May School building for historic purposes and lease the surrounding acre for one year with renewal option for a mutually agreeable sum. We intend to establish a non-profit foundation for long term restoration and maintenance of the building to increase the cultural and historic resources of this area." Further developments will be reported in our next Newsletter.

PUBLICATIONS We now have a good selection of books and booklets about Livermore history for sale and also packets of notepaper designed by Guild member Marilyn Calhoun. They may be bought from the History Center whenever it is open and they will be for sale at the big Christmas Bazaar in the Recreation Center on Nov. 15, 16 and 17. MAY SCHOOL We have signed a contract with the Livermore school board to buy the May School for \$1 and to lease the two acres of land for \$50 per year, renewable for a total of ten years. We must provide liability insurance and meet the requirements of the Fire Marshall. The greatest need is for a new roof. We are fortunate that Dorothy Nielsen has agreed to be the Chairperson of the May School Restoration Committee. She will supervise the work and see to it that it is structurally sound and historically accurate.

Dorothy has already acquired a donation of a square of No.1 grade cedar shingles. We need about 30 squares. If you can help us in any way to obtain lumber or can help with the work, please call Dorothy at 447-6187 or Janet Newton, 447-9592. It will be a wonderful achievment to save and restore this beautiful old building.

CARNEGIE BUILDING We are looking for people to man the history center as docents. We will have the museum open on Saturdays and Sundays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. There will be three two-hour shifts of two people. We want men as well as women. Please phone Walter Bullard, 447-3577, or Karen Rasmussen, 443-9528 if you want to help with this interesting work.

These hours are on a trial basis for two months, beginning on Nov.2, (except Thanksgiving) to learn the public response. We are planning a docent training program to provide museum tours during the week for groups of ten or more visitors on an appointment basis. Let us know if you want to participate in the training programs.

We also need cabinet workers to put doors and/or glass fronts on our exhibit cases. And we need a display cabinet for our publications. Please let us know if you can help.

The first item is in the May 23, 1874 issue of THE LIVERMORE HERALD. (All these excerpts are from the Herald)

April 21, 1906: "The damage here (from the S.F. earthquake) was confined to the railroad water tank, the falling of other tankhouses...and the toppling of chimneys on the Mc Leod block, the depot, and other high buildings."

June 30, 1906: "SOUTHERN PACIFIC REDUCES RATES. Sweeping Reductions...
the purpose...is development."
Same paper: "San Francisco to Los Angeles (200 passengers a day)
reduced from \$15 to \$14."


From a hand-written document (in pencil) lent to us from the Louis L. Stein Jr. collection, we learn that on October 5, 1914, the Southern Pacific passenger timetable #156 (for Livermore) included the following trains, both eastbound and westbound: THE NEWSBOY, SACRAMENTO PASSENGER, STOCKTON & SACRAMENTO PASSENGER, STOCKTON PASSENGER, STOCKTON FLYER and the TRACY PASSENGER. Mr. Stein has written at the bottom of the sheet, "Last passenger train, Jan. 22, 1941."

S.P.DEPOT The Gala Preview party of the LIVERMORE STATION was a great success. We had a sell-out crowd of happy people and we collected enough donations to buy about half of the cedar shingles needed for the May School roof. The restaurant is a credit to Livermore, a charming reminder of our history.

During the festivities at the depot a valuable document pertaining to the building's history was presented to the Guild. It is the receipt for \$500, dated Feb. 22, 1973, paid by Otto Birk and Del Sullivan to the A.Allen Demolition Co. of Oakland for "the railroad station in Livermore". The buyers planned to tear down the building immediately. Mrs. Dorothy Rosa, a close friend of the Sullivans, told them that she thought it was a shame for the town to lose such a historically important building. Mrs. Rosa was given permission to call the newspapers and others, to alert them to the danger of this loss. The result was that the demolition was delayed and eventually stopped, as we all know. It seems clear that the preservation of the building began with Mrs. Rosa's actions and also, as a consequence, the formation of the Guild. We are very pleased to add this document to our archives and we thank Del Sullivan for his gift.

MAY SCHOOL Dorothy Nielsen has the authority to buy a supply of shingles for the re-roofing and soon will be calling for volunteers to help with the big job of putting them in place. An enlargment of the photograph of the school taken in 1889 will be a valuable aid in achieving an accurate restoration.

CARNEGIE BUILDING Our big job this year will be combining the work of installing wiring and cabinet making and general setting-up of archival and exhibit facilities with a program of public exhibitions. One part of the program will be an "artifact of the month" series on Sunday afternoons when we will ask collectors and old timers to bring in their precious items just for the afternoon. We already have a number of family histories in our files and would like to collect many more. We hope that all those interested will give us a brief account of when their family came to the valley and from where, and what their life in the valley has been. One or two photographs would be a valuable addition.

BICENTENNIAL The Heritage Guides of Monterey, the group authorized to conduct a program leading to a re-enactment of the Anza expedition of 1776, reports that "Members of the North American Trail Ride Conference, Horsemen of both Arizona and California, Charros of Mexico and the U.S. as well as walking groups will participate in the over-all expedition...it will be treated as a relay...Individual participation in the Expedition is encouraged..." We will keep you informed about the part of the ride that will be through the eastern end of the Livermore Valley.

LIVERMORE NATIVE HONORED Donald C. Tretzel, a June 1930 graduate of Livermore High School, recently retired from a brilliant 44 year career with

Kaiser Industries. Mr. Tretzel's greatest efforts were in Jamaica where he was Vice President and Resident Manager of Kaiser Bauxite Co. Honors have been heaped on "the slender young man" who started his career in 1930 at the Kaiser Sand & Gravel Co. in Radum (a railroad station between Livermore and Pleasanton). Members of the Kaiser company met with us earlier this year to learn more about Donald C., having noticed the term "Tretzel's Grove" in an article in the Tribune. The Grove was, however, named for another branch of the Tretzel family. It is now a park called Sycamore Grove.

LIVERMORE NOTES FROM ALL OVER DEPT. contd. On a trip that included Lake Chapala, Mexico, Janet Newton was with a group invited to the home of Jack Mc Donald, the noted U.S. sportswriter. At the mention of Livermore, Mr. Mc Donald immediately said that Joe Oescnger of Livermore pitched the longest game in baseball history in 1921 (a 24 inning tie game between the Braves and the Dodgers). Turns out that Oeschger was, and is, from Ferndale, Calif., but that he has strong Livermore connections. Mrs. Ida Murray is his sister and Mrs. Phyllis Westmoreland is his daughter. He spent Christmas, 1974 in Livermore!

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The work of the Livermore Heritage Guild has been the result of the efforts and generosity of a great many people, from the work of the depot pledge drive to the restoration of the May School.

IN THE DEPOT PLEDGE DRIVE Dudley Cantua donated the gilded spikes that were used and Anna Brown and Merilyn Calhoun the nice lettering on them. Barry Schrader donated the old plank and the lettering on it where we put the names of those who pledged. Bill Ray donated a beautiful old railroad lantern to the depot project (it will be part of the Guild display in the Livermore Station). Many people worked on collecting the signatures of our supporters.

FOR THE CARNEGIE BUILDING Our first offer of support came from Manual Duarte and John Sarboraria who told us that the collection of old Livermore drug store artifacts that were in the now-closed First St. store would be kept in safe storage for what they hoped would be a Livermore History Center in the Carnegie Building. Knowledge of this action prompted Louis L. Stein Jr. to bring to us a large collection of old drug store items including Livermore prescriptions. Since then Mr. Stein has brought us valuable railroad artifacts and old photographs. Mrs. John Wallace presented us with a group of old photographs of Livermore. Mr. Tony Ramirez brought us a Livermore saloon token found under an old building. Mrs. Graham Nissen brought us several items from the estate of Livermore's Judge Manley J. Clarke. Mrs. Martha Caughron gave us one of the spikes removed in the ceremonies beginning the Livermore track relocation. Miss May G. Nissen presented us with a black silk velvet and lace capelet used in Livermore long ago. Renée and Walter Bullard donated a photocopy of the 1896 special editions of the Livermore Herald to the History Center Library in addition to their gift of materials and a great deal of work time to our initial exhibit that is still on view. The Tri-Valley Herald donated mounted photocopies of old newspapers. Mr. Lawrence S. Germaine gave us a group of photos of the May School. Mr.&Mrs. T.E.Peiffer have regularly given us large glossy prints of the fine photographs they have taken of Guild activities. Dale Mooney presented us with the Livermore stationmaster's copy of the 1883 Wells Fargo Directory, and Del Sullivan gave us the document referred to above. Janet Newton donated a copy of Corral Hollow Notes and Memoranda collected by Earle E. Williams to the H.C. Library.

CARNEGIE BUILDING HISTORY CENTER A new show of enlarged old photos of Livermore will be on view during February. An exhibit of May School photos and maps is being installed. Come in and enjoy the show. Books, booklets and Guild stationery are for sale at the desk. Also the Cresta Blanca booklets for Charter members who have not yet picked them up.

BICENTENNIAL The Guild and the Livermore Bicentennial Organization (LBO) have agreed that the Guild program will be the official LBO "Heritage '76" program. This is in several parts: the restoration of the May School, the development of a first-class Livermore History Center, the preparation of a text on the history of Livermore, the publication of a booklet on the Anza expedition and the building up of a file of family histories of residents of this area. We hope that everyone will participate in these programs.

Also we are planning to take part in the re-enactment of the Anza expedition. This is a very large-scale venture being planned by Mexico, Arizona and California. We hope to share the two parts of the trip that pertain to this valley - the marriage of Josefa Livermore's grandparents at Mission San Xavier del Bac on Oct. 26, 1775 and the crossing of the east end of this valley on April 4, 1776. In 1976, April 4 will be on a Sunday, just right for a big barbecue and fandango in Robertson Park.

Bicentennial programs are available through LBO member David Abrahams at 447-9386. as follows: Slide-sound show of the Anza expedition, (30 mins.); a slide show prepared by Bill Owens narrated by the Toastmasters; and slide shows with commentary by Herbert Hagemann and Janet Newton can be arranged.

BUCKLEY ESTATE The application by the LARPD to the Board of Supervisors for a "Point of Historical Interest" designation was successful. This is the first step in getting a State Historical Landmark number, after which the property will be elligible for funds from the State bond election of last June.

MAY SCHOOL Dorothy Nielsen will be calling for volunteers to help with the work of installing a complete new roof as soon as time and weather permit. Other work must be done as soon as possible, such as repairing the shutters, making them secure and installing new locks. Be ready to do what you can to help.

HISTORY CENTER contd. Much work must be done to make our exhibits and our work center safe and effective. We need wiring for outlets both in the wall and in the floor (for the exhibit cases). We need to do extensive cabinet work. It is hoped that we can get financial assistance with the financing of the Center and we are applying for funds to help us. Studying the requirements for elligibility and submitting the necessary forms is a time-consuming job.

We have asked for help of a different kind from Chabot College. We would

like to have the help of students in the preparation of exhibits and we hope that young people interested in a museum career with work with us and help us.

ST. RAYMOND'S RESTORATION COMMITTEE will have an IRISH FEST on March 15 at the Fairgrounds in Pleasanton. See enclosed information sheet.

CORRECTIONS Jack Mc Donald writes from Chapala, Mexico that he didn't say that Joe Oeschger came from Livermore (as reported in the last Newsletter) but that Joe's mother and several other relatives lived there. Also that his mother who died in Livermore not long ago, lived to be over a 100. We are pleased to hear from Mr. Mc Donald and we hope to learn more of Joe Oeschger's family.

SUNDAY, MARCH 2nd. We will have a party at the History Center in the Carnegie Building from 2-4 p.m. in honor of the new exhibit on the May School. The Livermore Art Association will join us in the festivities and will have art in action downstairs. Refreshments will be served. We will have old and new photos of the May School and copies of old maps. There will be a bound book for people to enter names of pupils and teachers of the school and the date they were in attendance. We would also like to have an information sheet filled out for each one. In addition we have some old photos of Livermore on display.

We are indebted to Kenneth Edwards, paleontologist of Chabot College for help with our study of the pre-history of this valley.

The History Center is open every Thurs. Fri. Sat. and Sunday, 11.30 to 4 p.m.

ARROYO SANATORIUM The following resolution was adopted at a special meeting held on Feb. 6: "RESOLVED: The Board of Directors of the Livermore Heritage Guild recommends that the Arroyo del Valle Sanatorium be considered for placement in the National Register of Historic Places." The criteria for inclusion in the National Register having been broadened so that national significance is no longer required.

BICENTENNIAL We have applied for recognition for four projects: restoration of the May School, creating a Livermore History Center, preparation of a text on the history of Livermore and publishing a booklet on the Anza expedition. Bicentennial flags, pins and decals are available at local banks. Get in the spirit of '76 and buy your flags soon.

The re-enactment of the Anza expedition of 1775-76 will be a large-scale venture, beginning in Mexico and continuing through Arizona and California. Early in August, 1975, the Royal Decree to found the City of St. Francis will be presented in Mexico City and Anza and his company will depart with the decree and a thousand souvenir facsimilies in their saddle bags. Festivities along the way include fandangoes, barbecues, dedication of parks, singing of Masses and displays of historical artifacts. Costumes will be authentic. A supplier of hats and firearms has been found and souvenir saddle bags and spurs will be available. We plan to participate on April 4, 1976, a Sunday, with a barbecue and fandango in Robertson Park.

LADDSVILLE We were pleased to get a long letter from Harold G. Wright in Oregon, giving us information about the town that preceded Livermore. Ladds-ville was where Junction Ave. meets East First Street and it started when Alphonso Ladd settled there in 1864. We are pleased to add to the information in our files and we hope Mr. Wright will continue to share with us.

MAY SCHOOL RESTORATION The weather is not yet stable enough for Dorothy Nielsen to plan a big work party, but when it is we will be calling on everyone to pitch in and help. There will be jobs for everyone.

RE-ENACTMENT OF THE ANZA EXPEDITION OF 1775 - 1776

In 1775, Col. Juan Bautista de Anza was ordered to make an overland trip from New Spain (now Mexico) to Alta California to escort a colony of settlers and to select the site for the Presidio and Mission of San Francisco. The difficulties of the journey were immense but Anza successfully overcame them.

He left Mexico City in August and proceeded to Sonora where he began to recruit the settlers for California. Soon after the expedition had begun, the chaplain of the trip, Fray Pedro Font, had the pleasant duty of performing three marriages of young people of the colony. Two of the participants were the grandparents of Josefa Higuera Livermore, the wife of the man for whom this town was named.

On October 26, 1975, as part of the re-enactment of the Anza expedition, the marriages will be re-enacted. We are hoping to have representatives from Livermore to witness this ceremony (and whatever other celebrations are planned in Arizona at that time) and we would like to have volunteers for the participants in the marriage. (It would be wonderful to have descendants).

October 26, 1975 will be a Sunday and the following day is a holiday, Veterans Day. If enough Livermore people sign up for a three-day week-end jaunt, we can get a special rate. Please call David Abrahams if you are interested, at 447-9386

The Heritage Guild's four projects have been endorsed by the County Commission, including the booklet about the Anza expeditions of 1774 - 1776. Loan funds to cover the cost of printing the booklet have been granted by the Heritage Guild, the Livermore Cultural Arts Council and the Alameda County Bicentennial Commission. The proposal must now be endorsed by the County Supervisors.

The re-enactment of the marriage of Josefa Livermore's grandparents at Mission San Xavier del Bac in Arizona 200 years ago next October 26, will be witnessed by a number of Livermore citizens. If you are interested in joining the special trip, call David Abrahams at 447-9386.

Four LBO slide shows are available for showing to clubs and other groups - two sets of slides of old and new Livermore narrated by the Toastmasters, two slide programs on Livermore history narrated by Herbert Hagemann and Janet Newton, and the Anza expedition slide and sound show. CARNEGIE BUILDING We are pleased that the exhibit at the History Center is being used by local schools. We have had three third grade classes and two groups of high school students. EXCERPTS FROM OLD NEWSPAPERS Livermore Herald, June 20, 1924:

"Improvement of the Cresta Blanca road has been one of the biggest problems Supvervisor T.E.Knox has had on his hands in a long time. The handling of the immense amount of heavy hauling which is going over the road since construction of the U.S.Veterans Bureau hospital started would cause a problem under the best of conditions, but with the scarcity of water this season the difficulties were greatly increased.

Arroyo Sanatoriùm's water supply usually furnishes water for sprinkling, but this year there was no surplus. Efforts were made to obtain water from several places along the road, but in every instance the water was being used for irrigation. An attempt was made to develop an old well on Del Valle Farm, but it failed. Finally it was decided to pump from the creek..."

same issue: West First Street is now Open to Traffic. The construction crews completed their work the first of the week and the new paving made ready for use. The opening of this strip fills in the gap which previously existed between the end of the paving at M Street and the end of the Livermore-Pleasanton highway. It also completes the paving of First Street from the eastern end to the western town limits and gives paved connection with all the highways of the valley."

Rural schools played a fundamental part in the development of this country.

Very much more work needs to be done on the old building and much more money needs to be raised. A good fence around the property would help to protect it and make it possible to use animals to keep down the weeds. The well needs to be repaired and made useable. The list of capital improvements needed is long. But there is much work for willing hands, such as picking up the best of the old shingles for preservation and putting the others into piles to be sold for kindling. CARNEGIE BUILDING We have learned to our dismay that the badly needed reroofing of this fine old building is not in any budget! The building belongs to the City. It is an asset to the people of Livermore and must be
conserved as such. Judging by the appearance of the ceiling (the beautiful
ceiling) of the main floor, the leaky roof is not anything new. The time
has past for pardonable delay in providing for the job. A good roof is the
first item in the preservation of a building. We must have a program for
preservaing this handsome part of downtown Livermore. It should begin with
the roof and continue with the the protection of the exterior. Talk to
your City Councilpersons!

A letter forwarded to us by the City Manager, from the U.S. Dept. of the Interior, calls our attention to the availability of funds for preserving "The identity, sense of place, historic value, and economic viability of your community through the rehabilitation of structures and neighborhoods of historic, architectural, or aesthetic value..." A committee could be formed to make recommendations to the City and to the Guild.

OTHER HISTORICAL DISPLAYS AT THE FAIR The Heritage Guild in partnership with the LARPD has an exhibit on the Buckley Estate in the ALVHS museum. You will enjoy seeing all the exhibits in the museum, including one for the Alameda County Historical Society on the town of Tesla in Corral Hollow, done by Louis L. Stein Jr.

There is an exhibit of old agricultural machinery behind the old 4H poultry building, including a Best steam traction engine made in San Leandro in the early 1900s. The history of agriculture underlies all other history of this country and Alameda County played an important part in it. The support of all historians is needed to help preserve these significant artifacts.

Nearby is an exhibit of horse-drawn vehicles on loan from the Miller Horse & Buggy Ranch in Modesto. Support for the effort to make this collection a permanent public asset is greatly needed.

"Post Office hours: 7.50 a.m. to 8.30 p.m. except on Sundays when the office closes at 4 p.m."

"ITEMS FROM EVERYWHERE" "It is estimated that women spend \$8,000,000 a year on bustles."

"LOCAL ECHOES" "The windmill at the schoolhouse was sadly demoralized by the northwind Monday." "Geo.N. Raymond this week completed the laying of a brick foundation under the residence of N.B.Holmes." (Now the residence of Guild members Anna and Roger Brown.)

"Peter Donlon. formerly of Dublin met with a fatal accident at his ranch in Ventura County. He was standing near some gum trees which were being topped when the ladder fell and striking Mr. Donlon on the head crushed his skull." In the ads.: N.B. Holmes' ad includes "scroll sawing". There are three U.S. Land Office notices. Acreage for sale from \$8 to \$100 an acre. "House of four rooms, an acre of land, good well and outbuildings, \$1000." "In the spring of the year drink Livermore beer!" There is a large interesting ad for the Farmers' Union.

The Bd. of Trustees awarded a contract to John Beck for re-grading First Street on a bid of \$78.

OLD ST RAYMOND'S CHURCH We learn from the ALVHS Newsletter that the Church-yard Faire, the very successful fund-raising project at Old St. Raymond's Church in Dublin has been closed. This is necessary to complete the restoration of the interior. We congratulate Marie Cronin and all her hard-working committees for the enormous amount of work they have done on this project, work that has resulted in the saving of the Church. It is an ornament to the community as well as a valuable historical resource.

Working above and beyond the call of duty, the roofing crew was on the job July 26 and 27! The heat was merciless but they completed about a quarter of the roof on the west side. Please rally round and help with the rest of the job. There is work on the ground as well as on the roof. Commercially the new roof is worth about \$3500. Think how much our workers have contributed to the community!

The school tower will be restored with the accuracy the Nielsens are famous for. Some of the gingerbread has been taken down so that it can be worked on.

NEW BOARD MEMBER We are pleased that Edward Peiffer has accepted an appointment to the Board of Directors. Edward and his wife Olga are the Guild members on the team of workers collecting oral histories of the Valley.

BICENTENNIAL The booklet THE ANZA EXPEDITIONS TO ALTA CALIFORNIA, 1774-1776, is now for sale at the Carnegie Building and other outlets. This is the story of the marvellous achievment of the early Spaniards in exploring and opening a land route from New Spain to Upper California 200 years ago. The Livermore Valley can be proud that it has connections with the story. Many residents of the Valley are descendants of members of the expedition. The grandparents of Josefa Livermore were married when the group stopped at Mission San Xavier del Bac in what is now Arizona. Part of Anza's mission was to select the site for the presidio and mission of St. Francis and to explore the regions near what we know as San Francisco Bay. His explorations took him across the east end of this valley. All of these notable events will be commemorated in the Bicentennial celebrations.

The booklet is a project of the Livermore Bicentennial Organization (LBO) and is part of all three Bicentennial themes. It is Heritage '76, fund-raising for Festival '76 and other projects, and it is a resource for Horizons '76.

CARNEGIE BUILDING The lighting in the Carnegie Building is quite inadequate. We have been told that a new 100 amp service is needed and that though the City electricians can do the work there is no money in either the City or the LARPD budget to pay for the supplies. The Guild must provide the supplies or the money to pay for them.

In order to have improved lighting in time for the Fall Festival, we have asked that the minimal work should be started without delay - the added service and one floor outlet. As it is now, students have to stand in their own shadow in order to look at an exhibit in detail. We plan to put lights into the cabinets themselves in order to avoid track lighting that would hide the handsome olf library ceiling.

We would be glad to have help of any kind with this project.

GIFTS MADE TO THE GUILD ON BEHALF OF FRIENDS OF MEMBERS Since December 1972, the Guild has received donations that were made in lieu of gifts from members to their friends. We are very pleased to be remembered in this way. Wedding anniversaries or any other occasions can be honored by a gift to the Guild. A special letter will be sent to the recipient.

<u>OLD NEWSPAPERS</u> Two Guild workers spent a whole hot afternoon sorting our new store of old papers by year. The papers range from 1887 to 1919. We will now work on them a year at a time. We have already gleaned much information from them that is being put into our history index. Space limitations make it difficult for many people to work on the papers, plus the fact that they are very fragile, but we hope to work out a plan that will make it possible.

From the 1891 papers we learn that the S.P.Depot, built in 1869, burned to the ground and that in 1892 a new depot was being built. We do not yet know when it was finished or if it was the same one that is now the Livermore Station, but further reading will tell us.

We can date old houses from items in the papers. The Buckley house was begun in 1891 (cost \$8000). Also in 1891 there was a shipment of brandy from the Buckley estate, therefore the vineyard and the winery must have been established several years earlier.

St. Clair, the imperial czar of ball tossers says that the ovation tendered him from the grandstand was very gratifying. Kolatire is making his 16th grand semiannual farewell bridal tour of the diamond. He is a bachelor. M. Crane says it takes the hope and joy and pride all out of a nine to be scooped like this by the Deweys. J. Teeter says Crane's Park is getting to be quite a summer place, and a person can go out there and spend the afternoon and fill their system full of baseball and be entirely safe from the prying eyes of his mother-in-law. The Any Old Things will play the Deweys next Sunday for a ball, winners to take the ball, and the losers to pay for it."

The Guild has been told that it must pay for the supplies needed to bring the building up to code. We would welcome any support for this project.

The exhibits are seen by many people - teachers, out-of-town visitors, old-timers and many young people.

ANNUAL MEETING We are very pleased that August Hagemann has consented to talk to us about the history of agriculture in the Livermore Valley. Merilyn Calhoun, the program chairman, will assist him by showing slides. Both Mr. Hagemann and Merilyn are particularly qualified to talk about this subject, both being descendants of very early pioneers of this valley. Mr. Hagemann is a graduate of the Univ. of California School of Agriculture at Davis, as was his father, the late August Hagemann. Our speaker's grandfather, also August Hagemann, was the Secretary of the Board of the Livermore Union High School in 1896 when Mrs. Calhoun'e forebear, Daniel Teeter was the President of it. Both men were farmers. Agriculture was the foundation of the valley's economy.

The meeting will begin with a short business session at 6 p.m. when the proposed bylaw changes will be voted on. Dinner will begin at 6.30, after which we will have an election of officers before our program begins.
